Preface

This unusual volume marks the sixtieth anniversary of the National Bureau of Economic Research. In contrast to the technical and specialized character of most NBER studies, the current book is designed to provide the general reader with a broad and critical overview of the American economy. The result is a volume of essays that range from monetary policy to productivity development, from population change to international trade.

A special feature of the volume is the combination of a basic background study on each subject with the personal statements of leading by an outstanding scholar who is an expert on his subject. Each is accompanied by two personal reflections on the changing character of the postwar economy. The distinguished individuals who have written these personal statements have been leaders in shaping national thought and frequently have also been important participants in the forming of government policy and the directing of the private economy. Since the unique mission of the NBER throughout its sixty-year history has been to provide objective and quantitative economic research to serve as a basis for public and private policies, the present combination of background papers and personal statements is a very fitting way for the Bureau to celebrate its anniversary.

The authors of the essays in this volume met for a two-day conference in January 1980. Since the background papers were distributed in advance, much of the discussion at the meeting focused on the personal statements. A very brief summary of the discussion, prepared by Jeffrey Sachs, is included in each section of the volume.

The original idea for an NBER review of the postwar experience of the United States economy was developed in discussions with Dr. John Sawyer, president of the Andrew Mellon Foundation. I am grateful to Dr. Sawyer for his suggestions and to the Mellon Foundation for its support of this project.

All the participants in the project are grateful to Maureen Kay for her efficient help with the conference and with the preconference distribution of material.
