ABSTRACT

TYPE OF FILE:

Microdata; unit of observation is individuals within housing units.

UNIVERSE DESCRIPTION:

The universe consists of all persons 14 years old and over in the civilian noninstitutional population of the United States living in households. The probability sample selected to represent the universe consists of approximately 55,000 households.

SUBJECT-MATTER DESCRIPTION:

Data are provided on labor force activity for the week prior to the survey. Comprehensive data are available on the employment status, occupation, and industry of persons 14 years old and over. Also shown are personal characteristics such as age, sex, race, marital status, veteran status, household relationship, and educational background.

Additional information is provided about persons who did unpaid volunteer work. Data include types of work done, number of hours spent, and reasons for doing volunteer work.

GEOGRAPHIC COVERAGE:

Thirteen States are identified by geographic division; thirty-four SMSA's are ranked by population size (1970). Central city/noncentral city indicators are provided for all SMSA's.
