NBER's pre-doctoral fellowship program, funded by the National Institute on Aging under the direction of Professor David A. Wise, gives pre-doctoral fellows exposure to a wide range of NBER research projects related to the economics of aging and health care. Participating fellows pursue independent research while benefiting from opportunities for regular interaction with the Bureau's large network of prominent investigators working in this field.

Fellows receive a 12 month stipend of \$22,920; carrel space and use of computer facilities at the Bureau's Cambridge office; tuition support; and limited funds for travel and research expenses.

Eligibility

Applicants must be

- US citizens, non-citizen nationals, or lawfully admitted to the US for *permanent* residence
- Enrolled in a PhD program in the greater-Boston area

Note: We will consider applications from students enrolled in other PhD programs who are resident in the Boston area during the fellowship period.

NBER encourages applications from individuals from under-represented racial and ethnic groups; individuals with disabilities; and individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds.
