To encourage research that will deepen our understanding of the health and economic implications of disability policy, the NBER Disability Research Center, with funding from the Social Security Administration as part of its Disability Research Consortium, is offering support to outstanding economists to visit our Cambridge office for a year of intensive research.

The one-year stipend is \$65,000 along with office space and use of computer facilities at the Bureau's Cambridge office.

NBER seeks applications from early-career economists (new PhDs and junior faculty) and encourages applications from candidates from under-represented racial and ethnic groups; candidates with disabilities; and individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds.

Eligibility

Applicants must

- ◆ Have completed a PhD or have a tenure track faculty appointment at a North American college or university by the start of the fellowship *and*
- ◆ Address a topic directly relevant to disability policy

NOTE: NBER is not able to sponsor a visa for this fellowship.
