Dear Mr. Healy:

I write to apply to participate in the NBER Digitization Tutorial. I am currently a third year doctoral student in the Information Systems Department at Boston University's School of Management, working most closely with Prof. Marshall Van Alstyne.

To date, my doctoral coursework has focused on Economics of Digitization. I have, thus far, taken courses in Digitization, Information Systems and Information Technology at Boston University, Harvard, and MIT. My minor area of study has been Econometrics.

As I transition from coursework towards formulating a dissertation, I feel that participation in this Tutorial will be helpful by exposing me to an even broader array of ideas in digitization and by enabling me to participate more fully in the community of scholars for whom this is a core research interest. I am at the phase of the doctoral program in which I am formulating ideas for a dissertation. By participating in the tutorial and the Spring Economics of Digitization meeting, I hope that exposure to research at the frontier of this area and the opportunity for informal interactions with leading scholars and doctoral students might help me sharpen some of my own dissertation ideas.

I am most interested in questions relating to economics of technology platforms, two-sided markets and knowledge markets. I am currently working on the following projects, along with my advisor, Marshall Van Alstyne:

- Platform Strategies for Innovation: This is an empirical study of a large enterprise platform's App store. We are trying to take advantage of a natural experiment to study the impact of platform governance strategies on innovation incentives for developers. Currently, we are in the process of working with the company to gain access to data.
- *Market Expansion:* We are also working on an analytical modeling paper that explores developers' and sellers' incentives for participating in platforms as opposed to remaining independent. This paper has already benefitted from conference feedback and we are currently working to incorporate suggestions from scholars.
- Digital Information Market for USPS: This is a practitioner-facing paper that was written to help the US Postal Service explore strategies for creating a two-sided digital platform. If implemented, this strategy might allow the USPS to compete effectively in the digital age. This paper was completed in summer of 2013.
- Interaction Economy: This is another practitioner-oriented paper on which I am currently working with Prof. Erik Brynjolfsson. In it, we explore pricing strategies for digital products in relation to the kind of network or interaction effects involved.
